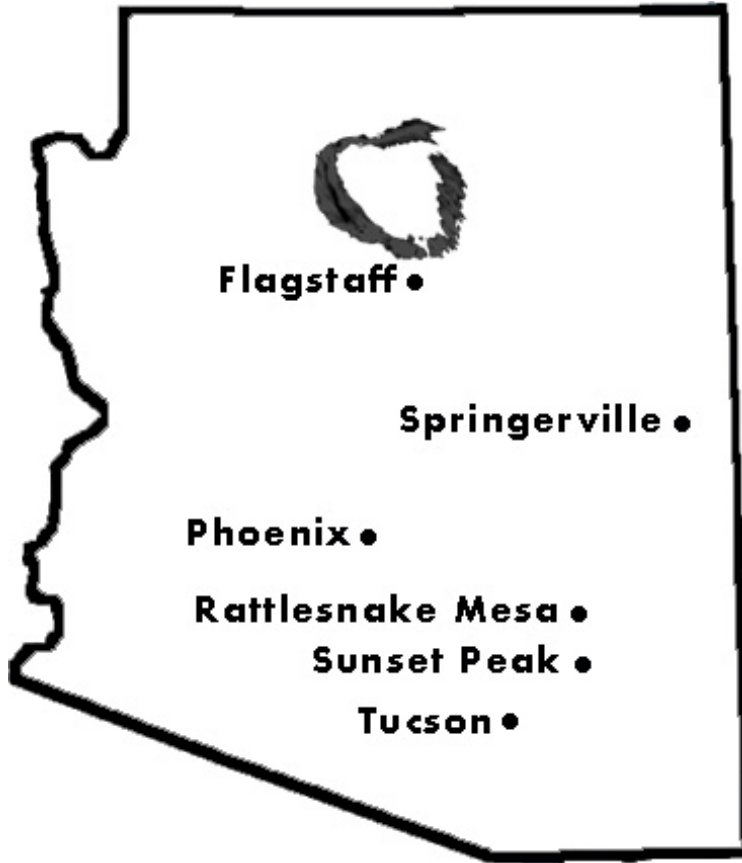


# The Simple Truth about Arizona Geography.



**William Branham said:**

"I looked where it was at: **northeast of Flagstaff**, or Prescott, which is below Flagstaff. Well, that's just where we was at, see, just exactly."  
June 1, 1963

"And it shall be Light at the evening time upon Sunset Mountain in the Coronado Forest, **forty miles north of Tucson**. Get on the map and see if Sunset Peak there. That's exactly where it happened."  
July 25, 1965

"I was up way back into the mountains, **nearly to Mexico**, with two brethren that's setting here, picking cocklebur--or sand burrs off of my trouser leg, and a blast went off that almost, looked like, shook the mountains down."  
March 25, 1963

<b>Flagstaff</b>	<b>Feb. 28, 1963</b>	"The southern tip of the cloud lay about ten miles north of Flagstaff <b>at about 18:40 MST.</b> " (James E. MacDonald, Institute of Atmospheric Physics, U. of Arizona, May 31, 1963)
<b>Springerville</b>	<b>March 1, 1963</b>	"Residents here, accustomed to sonic booms, called Williams Air Force Base [south of Phoenix] to complain of the apparent increase in loudness." (The Arizona Republic Newspaper)
<b>Houston, Texas</b>	<b>March 4, 1963</b>	William Branham preached in Houston, Texas on March 4, 1963. On June 23 of the same year he said, "I had to go to Houston about getting that little boy saved from the electric chair. And then I went back and I went hunting up there with the brethren. And that morning, I was standing there picking cockleburs...off of my trouser leg."
<b>Rattlesnake Mesa</b>	<b>March 8, 1963</b>	"Less than two hours after leaving Tucson, they turned off the paved road at Wilcox, and onto the dirt road that led to Bonita and into the canyons scattered across the rimrock of Rattlesnake Mesa."  (The Road To Sunset, written by Rebecca Smith-Branham, in the Only Believe Magazine. Which describes that William Branham was hunting <b>in the morning</b> on March 8, 1963 when he heard a blast.)
