Speaks, Hears Better, She States, Since Attending 'Faith' Service

Miss Mary Bruce, 209 Fifth avenue, north, who spent 10 years in schools for the deaf here and in Winnipeg, said "daddy" and "mamma" and "hear me" quite clearly after she had been prayed for by the Rev. William Branham at the Apostolic Church, Nineteenth street and Avenue G, Wednesday evening, where 800 persons had gathered to witness "healing through faith."

(Miss Bruce, interviewed by the Star-Phoenix, Friday, said that she could speak much more clearly than before the service. She said she could hear quite well with her right ear but the left ear was still deaf. She believed she would be able to speak normally within a short time. Other girls in the dry cleaning plant where Miss Bruce is employed said that she had been much more cheerful since the service, and there had been a noticeable improvement in her speech. Her landlady said the girl was saying "good morning" and "good-bye," something she had not done in the three months she had been staying with her.)

While the congregation sat with bowed heads, the 100 people to be cured filed past Mr. Branham, as he prayed for them each in turn. The congregation

were told that entire belief and reverence were necessary, and all must bow their heads. Those who did not were asked to leave the church.

who spent 10 years in schools for the deaf, says she is able to speak more clearly and hear better since she was prayed for by the Rev. William Branham at the Apostolic service.

Branham said was suffering from the cancer turned white as the evangelist prayed. This, he said, was an indication that she was cured. He told her that in a few days she would become very ill, but this would only be the action of the blood taking the cancer out of the body, and following this illness she would be free from her long suffering.

Those wishing to be healed were instructed not to hold anything in their right hands, for at least five minutes prior to appearing before the minister, as it would spoil the vibrations by which he was able to determine the nature of the illness. "It is only a germ disease I can determine by this means," he said.

Prior to Mr. Branham's arrival, the congregation heard from other speakers who told of the marvelous work already done through faith. One woman testified she had been prayed for, and the following morning, her one deaf ear was again normal, and several other minor ailments had vanished. One of the speakers mentioned a woman from Regina, who had been able to bear only a liquid diet for months, but the morning following a prayer for her, she arose and enjoyed a normal breakfast. Mr. Branham's younger brother, who travels with him, said,

the minister received the gift of divine healing about 11 months ago, and had cured about 35,000 people of every race, creed, and denomination since that time. "Healing comes only to those who fully believe in my brother's ability to have God heal him," he added.

Following a radio broadcast, Sunday morning, through which he will attempt to cure those whom he has not had time to see personally, Mr. Branham will hold a mass meeting in the Arena, Sunday night, and then travel on to Edmonton and Calgary.

C.C.F. Backs Irrigation

The provincial convention of the C.C.F. party in its concluding session here, Thursday, reaffirmed its support of the South Saskatchewan River Development Association (damning and irrigation) and urged the federal government to proceed immediately to fulfill its 1945 election promises.
